Russia's Past as Future

Great Decisions February 16, 2008

On March 2, 2008, just two days before Ohio's presidential primary, a presidential election will take place in Russia. In both the U.S. and Russia, the current presidents are term-limited. Neither George W Bush nor Vladimir Putin can constitutionally run for office again. Unlike in the U.S., where there is a vigorous contest for presidential candidates in primary elections, in Russia there will be one candidate for president on the ballot. Yet voting is taken seriously as a civic duty in Russia. This seems strange to the U.S. but there are good reasons historically why Russian elections are conducted the way they are. Dr. Don Rowney, professor of history at BGSU, explained to the audience at the Great Decisions forum on Februarv 16 at the Wood county Senior Center about the structures and institutions in Russia's history which shape its present and future.

Russia--the Russian Federation--while smaller than the former Soviet Union, is still the largest country in the world. Because of its size and the large number and diversity of ethnic subgroups, Russia is difficult to govern. Governing institutions have evolved over centuries to achieve objectives of maintaining control over the far-flung populations. The main links between the capital in Moscow and the people are state officials. These officials are appointed and served the interests of the state, not those of the people. There are no elected political intermediaries, no independent judiciary. The government is highly bureaucratized. For hundreds

of years governing elites have risen through state administration or the military. Lenin and Stalin were exceptions. Since Stalin, all Russian heads of state have risen to the top through state administration. Strong independent politicians are rare, due to lack of an independent power base.

The lack of a free media means the public has limited information about the activities of the government--what they do know is what the government wants them to know. Television is statecontrolled while print media are somewhat freer.

All power rests with the government. The consequences of this include patronage/clientism, corruption, a spoils system, and there is no stable system of selection & promotion in the state civil service. The government culture throughout Russia's history has been that Moscow and St Petersburg are where careers are made.

The next Great Decisions talk will be on Saturday February 23 at 9:30 a.m. at the Wood County Senior Center. The topic will be "U.S. Defense and Security Policy" and the speaker will be Luke Nichter, Ph.D. candidate in history at BGSU.

US Defense & Security Policy

Great Decisions February 23, 2008

Luke Nichter, PhD fellow in the history department at BGSU, began the Great Decisions

session on February 23 by asking audience members if they had decided on a presidential

candidate for the March 4 primary election. Most hands went up. Then he asked how many

people were familiar with the defense and security policies of their candidate of choice. Only

a few hands went up. Thus he illustrated that defense and security policies have not been a

major theme during the primary campaign domestic policies have been more discussed.

Nichter sees the three biggest defense and security policy challenges facing the US as nuclear

proliferation, its relationship with China, and its relationship with Russia. The US still has the

most powerful military, spending as much as the rest of the world combined.

The author of the companion reading offers three possible directions that US defense policy

can take. One is to maintain American dominance through the use of pre-emptive military

action, in which the US would probably be acting without partners. The second is for the US

to use military power for deterrence and containment while forming coalitions with other

nations. The third option is for US to work multilaterally with other nations, jointly

addressing issues such nuclear proliferation, with the military being one component of such

cooperative efforts

Nichter believes the foreign policy of the next president, whether Republican or Democrat,

will be different than that of the Bush administration. The next president may be more

cautious about getting into another overt conflict. He sees the next president following a

policy which is a combination of the three options above.

External factors affecting US defense and security policy include new leadership in Russia and

in Europe, the emergence of China as a world power, and the probability of serious talks to

reform the United Nations and NATO. The NATO alliance was formed to prevent war during

the Cold War; with the Cold War over NATO needs to re-define itself.

The final Great Decisions talk will be on Saturday March 1 at 9:30 a.m. at the Wood County

Senior Center. The topic will be "Latin America: Shift to the Left?" and the speaker will be

Amilcar Challu from the history department at BGSU.
